You Can Have a Green and Vibrant Landscape While Conserving Water

Water usage increases significantly over the summer months when people are spending more time outdoors watering lawns, growing gardens, washing cars, etc. Here are some ways you can conserve water while gardening.

- 1. Water your lawn or plants with only enough water that the ground can absorb, avoiding runoff.
- 2. Set your mower to a higher level this provides shade to the roots to enable the soil to retain more moisture.
- 3. Attach a water nozzle to your garden hose to limit the flow of water.
- 4. Create watering zones in your garden to allow plants to share the water.
- 5. Planting ornamental grasses, native plants and drought resistant plants can be easier to maintain and require less water.
- 6. Water in the morning before 10:00 a.m. or later in the evening after 6:00 p.m. when temperatures are cooler and evaporation is minimized.
- 7. If using a sprinkler be sure you are only watering the greenery and not the sidewalk or street.
- 8. Use mulch in your gardens to retain the moisture in the soil longer.
- 9. Using grass clippings in vegetable gardens can keep the weeds away and helps retain the moisture in the ground.
- 10. Use a broom instead of a hose to clean off your driveway after gar dening.



Rain Barrels can help Conserve Water and Control Runoff

By using a rain barrel you will have your own water source during droughts, and lessen the runoff of harmful pollutants that can eventually end up in our natural waterways. This will also help prevent erosion.

Outdoor water use can account for 40% of usage during the summer months, therefore you could reduce your water bill. Collecting water around your home can also prevent flooding, dampness, and mold.

Rainwater is better for your plants and soil because it is highly

oxygenated, free of the salts and other additives contained in tap water, that can potentially harm plant roots.

Please Note: Mosquito prevention is very important with rain barrels. The lid should remain tightly secured on the top at all times to ensure that your rain barrel does not become a breeding area for mosquito's. Add a couple of drops of dish soap to the rain barrel to stop the mosquitoes from laying eggs. Dish soap will not harm plants. Adding a few drops of Olive Oil or cooking oil will also work. Another way to prevent mosquito breeding is to drain the barrel every few days (it takes 6-9 days for a larvae to reach adulthood).



To Rinse or not to Rinse



It can be confusing to know exactly how to prepare packaging for recycling, but it is important to prepare these items properly to ensure that they do not end up in a land fill.

We can all make a difference.



To determine whether or not to rinse a container here are some guidelines you can easily follow:

- ⇒ Empty containers before you put them into your recycling bin
- ⇒ Thick and sticky residue e.g. peanut butter, icing, mayonnaise should be rinsed
- ⇒ Soap e.g. dishwasher & laundry detergent, shampoo, hand soap, does not need to be rinsed
- ⇒ Thinner residue like sauces need a quick rinse
- ⇒ If you cannot remove the lid or cap just be sure to empty the contents before placing into your bin

Getting every single spot is not necessary just use your best judgement. Lower contamination in your recycling leads to a higher quality recycling stream.
