Christmas Tree Removal

If you are not participating in the tree chipping event on January 7th (see page 2 for details), you will need to have an oversized item tag attached to your tree to have it collected by the trash hauler on any regular trash pick-up day.

Paper Christmas wrap is recyclable (wrap made with foil, metallic or glitter material is <u>not</u> recyclable). Be sure to remove bows and ribbons.



Flatten and fold the paper before putting it into the bin.

TEN WAYS TO CONSERVE WATER INSIDE YOUR HOME

Take short showers instead of baths

Repair dripping faucets by replacing washers

Use a refillable water bottle instead of using multiple cups

Avoid flushing the toilet unnecessarily Operate your washing machine and dishwasher when full

Consider installing an instant water heater

If the toilet flush handle sticks replace or adjust it

Turn the water off while shaving, washing your hands, washing your face, and while brushing your teeth

Insulate your water pipes to heat water faster

Scrape dishes instead of rinsing them and soak pots and pans if necessary

Winter Weather Reminders

* Sidewalks need to have a clear path of at least 3 feet wide the entire length of your sidewalk within 12 hours of snow, ice or sleet ceasing to fall.



- * Vehicles should be moved off the road whenever possible so the snow plows can clear the roads from curb to curb.
- * Roadways are not the place to put your snow. Make sure to put your snow from your vehicle, sidewalk, and drive way on a grass area. Move vehicles off the road whenever possible.
- * *Driveways* should be cleared AFTER the street has already been plowed if possible. You are <u>not</u> allowed to put snow from your driveway into the roadway. This will result in a fine.
- * Fire Hydrants should be cleared of all snow in case of an emergency.
- * Mailboxes should be clear of snow and ice to ensure mail delivery.

 Make sure your mailbox is in good condition and secure.
- * Your patience and cooperation is appreciated as we do our best to stay on top of the changing road conditions. Please stay clear of the plows as they work to keep the roadways safe and clear to allow emergency vehicles to get to where help is needed.
- * Always have an Emergency plan and keep emergency supplies on hand.



Please keep storm drains free from snow cover and ice to allow the water to drain and to prevent flooding.
