

Did you know your water meter display contains important information?

How to read your water meter....

There are several reasons why you might want to locate and read your water meter. First, you might be interested to know how much water you use in a day. By reading your meter at the beginning and end of a day, you can compare the readings to tell how much water you and your family used. The second reason is to check for leaks.



- 1. There are 9 digits / bars on the Sensus iPERmeter at the top of the digital display.
- 2. The last 2 digits, right of the decimal read in 10's and 100's. The first number to the left of the decimal is 1-gallon. Begin reading right of the decimal.
- 3. Unit of measure East Petersburg Borough reads in gallons.
- 4. To check for leaks, use the Flow Direction / Empty Pipe Indicator. If there is a plus sign in the middle of this circle, water is passing through the meter.
- 5. Battery life indicator.

To get your current usage, read the meter and write down the meter reading, then the next day do the same thing and subtract the numbers to find your daily usage. You can also chart your usage at more regular intervals to help you control your water usage. This is especially helpful in the summertime when watering lawns and flowerbeds can cause a dramatic spike in your water usage.

I think I have a leak—what could it be?

If you think you have a leak, the most likely culprit is a toilet that is running constantly. A faulty flapper on the toilet can cost you \$100 or more a month if it is allowed to run undetected. Other places to look for a leak include the base of your water heater, faucets with faulty washers and even your ice maker (if it fails to shut off as it's supposed to do.) The issue could also be a leaking underground pipe, which are often distinguishable by a path of green that is noticeably greener than the rest of the lawn. For a leak behind a wall or in a crawl space, look for discolored drywall or ceiling tile.

How to check for leaks...

- 1. Write down the meter reading.
- 2. Turn off all the water fixtures and appliances.
- 3. Write down the reading again on the meter.
- 4. Wait approximately 15 minutes.
- 5. Look at the flow indicator. Does the plus sign (+) disappear or remain?
 - (a) If the (+) sign disappears then the flow of water through the meter has stopped.
 - (b) If the (+) sign remains then a fixture in your home is still using water or you have a leak in your service line between the meter and your home.





East Petersburg Borough - Zoning Permits

Residential Pools

- Permits are required for all above or in-ground pools greater than 24 inches in depth.
- Setbacks vary according to Zoning District.
- Pools shall not be located in a front yard.
- Pools containing 24 inches or more of water depth shall include a fence, wall, above-ground pool walls or similar enclosure surrounding the pool no less than 4 feet above the ground. Pools over 4 feet are required to have a removable or lockable ladder.
- PADEP regulations require the discharge of water to be de-chlorinated unless discharged into a public sewer. (Please note: Storm Sewers located throughout the Borough are not public sewers).

Decks

- A permit is required for a deck.
- Setbacks vary according to Zoning District.
- Check for easements on the property, decks must not encroach on easements.

Patio

- A zoning permit is required for a patio.
- Setbacks vary according to Zoning District.
- Need to check with the Zoning Officer on the maximum allowed lot coverage, varies with Zoning District.
- Check for easements on the property.

Sheds

- A zoning permit is required for all sheds (including prefab sheds).
- No sheds are permitted in the front yard.
- Check for easements on the property. Sheds are not allowed in storm water easements.

Residential Fences

- Zoning permits are required for fences, including replacing an already existing fence.
- A corner lot is considered to have two front yards.
- No fence shall be built within an existing street right-of-way.
- Fences in the front yard must be of an "open type" picket, wrought iron or split rail and may not exceed 4 feet in height.

Driveways, Walkways, Sidewalks

 Zoning permits are required for new driveways, sidewalks and walkways or for replacements/expansions of any of these, as well as resurfacing a driveway.

Please Note: Dumpsters and PODS are required to have a permit.

Property lines can be found by locating the property pins. If they are no longer there, you will need to contact a surveyor.

If you have questions concerning any of the above information, or for any other zoning information, call the Borough office. Questions regarding the interpretation of the ordinance should be forwarded to the Borough Zoning Officer.

PENNSYLVANIA URBAN NUTRIENT MANAGEMENT—SPRING GREENING

SPRING TO LIFE

As the snow melts away, the birds begin to sing and fresh life bursts from the soil heralding the approach of Spring and the lawn maintenance season.

For the 1 million-plus acres of home lawns in Pennsylvania, selecting and implementing an appropriate lawncare management program to promote healthy and aesthetically pleasing lawns is not only important to homeowners, but is also essential to protecting our waterways.

KNOW WHAT'S BEST. SOIL TEST!

The first step to understanding what your lawn really needs to be lush, healthy and green is to know what your soil needs. It is important to conduct regular soil tests to determine nutrient deficiencies that should guide fertilizer selection and application. Soil test kits can be purchased for a nominal fee from our local Penn State Extension office 717-394-6851.

Following soil test recommendations, reading fertilizer label instructions, and using a properly calibrated spreader will ensure the right amount of nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium are applied, while reducing nutrient loss and fertilizer cost.

SOIL HEALTH. IT'S THE BOTTOM LINE.

Maintaining a happy, healthy soil is imperative to your lawn's succuss. Soil is the foundation for your lawn and is home to a multitude of microorganisms that are essential for plant growth. Take the time to support your soil by incorporating some simple practices into our lawn car program. Your lawn and wallet will thank you.

- **Keep it open.** Routine soil aeration can help reduce soil compaction. Good soil structure is essential for proper root growth, healthy microbe communities, and the movement and exchange of water, air, and nutrients.
- Raise it up. Maintain a taller lawn by only cutting 1/3 of the grass blade with each mowing. Taller lawns slow runoff and promote deeper roots, which reduces lawn stress and improves soil structure.
- **Put it back.** Return nutrients and organic matter back to the soil by mulching your leaves and grass clippings.

For more soil management strategies, contact your local county conservation district or Penn State Extension office.

GREEN LAWNS-CLEAN STREAMS

Pennsylvania's 2022 Fertilizer Law amendments were developed to protect Pennsylvania waterways and the waterways downstream. As a bonus, following the limitations in the law will boost our bottom line by ensuring that your investment doesn't wash away. The 2022 law established the following nitrogen and phosphorus limits for turf fertilizer applications.

- Nitrogen is limited to 0.9 pounds of total nitrogen and 0.7 pounds of available nitrogen. Per 1000 ft² per application.
- No phosphorus can be applied unless establishing or repairing turf.
- Nitrogen and phosphorus rates can be adjusted based on soil test recommendations and/or if using an enhanced–efficiency fertilizer.

In addition to the nutrient limitations, the law also established application parameters to prevent direct movement of fertilizer nutrients into our streams:

- Do not apply fertilizer if a heavy rain event is expected.
- Keep fertilizer away from drainage ditches, storm drains, or water. Maintain 15-foot buffer from the banks of all waterways.
- Remove fertilizer that lands on impervious surfaces (driveways, sidewalks, roads, parking lots).

WORKING TOGETHER FOR CLEAN WATER





WHAT TO DO WHEN THE POWER GOES OUT?

Losing power is an inconvenience in some cases, and life-threatening in others. Let's prepare now so you don't have to worry.

BEFORE THE POWER GOES OUT

- Gather emergency supplies including flashlights with extra batteries, bottled water, and blanket.
- Consider an alternative method for charging devices, such as a portable charger.
- Always keep your gas tank at least half full, if possible. Gas stations rely on electricity to power their pumps.
- Know where the manual release lever of your electric garage door opener is located and how to operate it.
- Plan for power-dependent medical devices and what you'd do in a power outage

If you know a power outage is possible due to upcoming bad weather, it's a good idea to:

- charge cellphones and battery-powered devices in advance.
- purchase ice, or freeze water-filled plastic containers to help keep food cold during a temporary power outage.

DURING THE POWER OUTAGE

- Keep refrigerator and freezer doors closed. Most food requiring refrigeration can be kept safely in a closed refrigerator for several hours.
 - An unopened refrigerator will keep food cold for about four hours.
 - A full freezer will keep the temperature for about 48 hours.
- Take steps to remain cool if it is hot outside. In intense heat when the power could be
 off for a long time, consider going to a movie theater, shopping mall or cooling shelter
 that opens in your community. If you stay home, move to the lowest level, since cool air
 falls. Wear lightweight, light-colored clothing. Drink plenty of water, even if you do not
 feel thirsty.
- Put on layers of warm clothing if it is cold outside. Never burn charcoal for heating or cooking indoors. Never use your oven as a source of heat. If the power could be out for a prolonged period, plan to go to another location that has heat to keep warm.
- Turn off or disconnect appliances and other equipment in case of a momentary power surge that can damage computers and other devices. Consider adding surge protectors.
- If you use your car to recharge devices, do NOT keep the car running in a garage, partially enclosed space, or close to a home. This can lead to carbon monoxide poisoning.

WHAT TO DO WHEN THE POWER GOES OUT?

AFTER THE POWER OUTAGE

- Throw away food that has been exposed to temperatures of 40°F for two hours or more, or that has an unusual odor, color, or texture. If food in the freezer is colder than 40° F and has ice crystals on it, you can refreeze it. Remember: When in doubt, throw it out.
- Contact your doctor if you're concerned about medications having spoiled.
- Restock emergency supplies you used up.

GENERATOR SAFETY

Generators can be helpful when the power goes out, but it's important to use them safely to prevent carbon monoxide poisoning and other hazards.

- Consult an electrician or engineer before purchasing and installing a generator for your home.
- NEVER run a generator inside a home or garage or connect it to your home's electrical system. Use outdoors, at least 20 feet away from windows, doors, and attached garage.
- Install working carbon monoxide detectors on every level of your home. It is colorless, odorless and kill people and pets.
- Follow manufacturer's instructions carefully.
- Keep generators dry and protected from rain or flooding. Touching a wet generator or device connected to one can cause an electrical shock.
- Always connect the generator with heavy-duty extension cords to appliances.
- Let the generator cool before refueling. Fuel spilled on hot engine parts can ignite.

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GET PREPARED



HAVE YOU BUILT YOUR EMERGENCY KIT?

To assemble your kit store items in airtight plastic bags and put your entire disaster supplies kit in one or two easy-to-carry containers such as plastic bins or a duffel bag.

WHAT TO PUT IN YOUR KIT?

- Water (one gallon per person per day for several days, for drinking and sanitation)
- Food (at least a several-day supply of non-perishable food)
- · Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert
- Flashlight
- First aid kit
- Extra batteries
- Whistle (to signal for help)
- Dust mask (to help filter contaminated air)
- Plastic sheeting, scissors and duct tape (to shelter in place)
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties (for personal sanitation)
- Wrench or pliers (to turn off utilities)
- Manual can opener (for food)
- Local maps
- Cell phone with chargers and a backup battery

CONSIDER ADDING THESE ADDITIONAL ITEMS:

- Soap, hand sanitizer and disinfecting wipes to disinfect surfaces
- Prescription medications
- · Any additional medical supplies needed
- Prescription eyeglasses and contact lens solution
- Infant formula, bottles, diapers, wipes and diaper rash cream
- Pet food and extra water for your pet
- Paper and pencil
- Books, games, puzzles or other activities for children

YOUR HOME EMERGENCY KIT



Maintaining Your Kit

After assembling your kit remember to maintain it so it's ready when needed:

- Keep canned food in a cool, dry place.
- Store boxed food in tightly closed plastic or metal containers.
- Replace expired items as needed.
- Re-think your needs every year and update your kit as your family's needs change.
